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DHS Notifies Chemical Facilities of Regulatory Obligations

On June 23rd, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) announced that facilities covered by the Chemical Facility Anti-Terrorism Standards (CFATS) will begin receiving letters detailing their security obligations. DHS has identified some 219 facilities that have been characterized as "Tier 1", 756 as "Tier 2" facilities, 1712 as "Tier 3" facilities, and 4319 as "Tier 4" facilities. DHS will also send letters identifying facilities that are not covered by the regulation at this time.

The letters identify the security issues and the "chemicals of interest" upon which the facility should focus in the Site-Vulnerability Assessment (SVA). The letters also state a specific date by which each facility will need to complete and submit its SVA. In general, Tier 1 facilities have 90 days; Tier 2, 120 days; Tier 3, 150 days; and Tier 4, 180 days. All letters will be sent via Federal Express and, if a facility is identified in Tiers 1-4, the letter will be marked "Chemical-Terrorism Vulnerability Information" (CVI).
