Hunton & Williams hosted an educational conference at its offices in Richmond on April 17, 2009, for more than 35 Thomas Jefferson High School students. The conference culminated the firm's participation in a new program designed by non-profits NALP and Street Law, Inc. to promote diversity in the legal profession.

This NALP/Street Law legal diversity program matched law firms in New York, Washington DC, Atlanta, San Francisco and Richmond with diverse and disadvantaged high school classrooms in their communities in an effort to engage the students, teach them about civil law and introduce them to careers in the legal profession.
